This Connection Experiment is designed for members of Scouts BSA. By completing this plan, you will fulfill all of the requirements for the Genealogy merit badge as well as requirements for each of Family Life, Communications, Citizenship in the community and citizenship in the world merit badges. You should work with a merit badge counselor and follow all Scouts BSA guidelines.

Additionally, this module contains alternative activities for Webelo/AOL Scouts who want to earn the Project Family and/or Looking Forward Looking Back Adventure.

7 USE YOUR WORDS

Define the following terms- genealogy, ancestor, and descendant then explain what the words from above mean to your counselor.

7 MAKE A TIMELINE

Scout Genealogy Merit Badge Requirement Two- Create a timeline for yourself or for a relative. Then write a short biography based on that time line.

CONDUCTING AN INTERVIEW

Scout Communication Merit Badge Requirement Four- Interview someone you know fairly well, like, or respect because of his or her position, talent, career or life experiences. Listen actively to learn as much as you can about the person. Then prepare and deliver to your counselor an introduction of the person as though this person were to be a guest speaker, and include reasons why the audience would want to hear this person speak. Show how you would call to invite this person to speak.

Scout Genealogy Merit Badge Requirement Three- With your parent's help, choose a relative or a family acquaintance you can interview in person, by telephone, or by e-mail or letter. Record the information you collect so you do not forget it.

Webelos Project Family Requirement One- Interview a grandparent, another family elder, or a family friend about what life was like when he or she was growing up.

5 INDIVIDUALS AND INSTITUTIONS

Contact ONE of the following individuals or institutions. Ask what genealogical services, records, or activities this individual or institution provides, and report the results:

- a. A genealogical or lineage society
- b. A professional genealogist (someone who gets paid for doing genealogical research)
- c. A surname organization, such as your family's organization
- d. A genealogical educational facility or institution
- e. A genealogical record repository of any type (courthouse, genealogical library, state or national archive, state library, etc.)

On another family group record form, show one of your parents and his or her brothers and sisters as the children. This requirement may be completed using the chart provided or the genealogy software program of your choice.

Scout Family Life Merit Badge Requirements Four and Five Plan and carry out a project that involves the participation of your family. After completing the project, discuss the following with your merit badge. counselor:

- A) The objective or goal of the project
- B) How individual members of your family participated
- C) The results of the project

With the approval of your parents or guardians and your merit badge counselor, decide on and carry out a project that you would do around the home that would benefit your family. Submit a report to your merit badge counselor outlining how the project benefited your family.

79 GENEALOGY ORGANIZATION

Identify three charitable organizations outside of Scouting that interest you and bring people in your community together to work for the good of your community.

Pick ONE of the organizations you chose for requirement 7a. Using a variety of resources (including newspapers, fliers and other literature, the Internet, volunteers, and employees of the organization), find out more about this organization.

With your counselor's and your parent's approval, contact the organization you chose for requirement 7b and find out what young people can do to help. While working on this merit badge, volunteer at least eight hours of your time for the organization. After your volunteer experience is over, discuss what you have learned with your counselor.

20 EXPLORE CULTURE

Citizenship in the community Requirement 8- Develop a public presentation (such as a video, slide show, speech, digital presentation, or photo exhibit) about important and unique aspects of your community. Include information about the history, cultures, and ethnic groups of your community; its best features and popular places where people gather; and the challenges it faces. Stage your presentation in front of your merit badge counselor or a group, such as your patrol or a class at school. Citizenship in the world-

Select a foreign country and discuss with your counselor how its geography, natural resources, and climate influence its economy and its global partnerships with other countries.

Visit with a student or Scout from another country and discuss the typical values, holidays, ethnic foods, and traditions practiced or enjoyed there. Participate in or attend an international event in your area, such as an ethnic festival, concert, or play.

Think of a creative way to describe yourself, using, for example, a collage, short story or autobiography, drawing or series of photographs, or a song or skit. Using the aid you created, make a presentation to your counselor about yourself.
